On the afternoon of the 19<sup>th</sup> we will have breakout groups focusing on the identification of bottlenecks impeding the implementation of connectivity conservation, and on specific actions and strategies that can be pursued to overcome these challenges.

- Please submit your proposals for talks (title and a brief summary, up to 100 words) and which session you would like to be in by the 5<sup>th</sup> of June.
- We might be able to offer videoconference facilities for presenters from outside Cambridge (TBC).
- We have 7 slots of 20 minutes for each session and space for some 20 posters.

We will host a wine reception on the 19<sup>th</sup>, which will also be a good opportunity to network and generally socialise.

A booking fee is still to be decided but we hope to keep it at a minimum thanks to some funding provided by IUCN's Connectivity Conservation Specialist Group.
